A.) OPENING CEREMONIES

CALL TO ORDER

The Council Meeting of the Township of Monroe was called to order at 7 p.m. by **Cncl. Pres., Gregory Wolfe** in the Courtroom of the Municipal Complex, located at 125 Virginia Avenue, Williamstown, New Jersey.

This meeting was advertised pursuant to the New Jersey Open Public Meetings Act (*N.J.S.A. 10:4-6 thru 10:4-21*). Adequate notice was placed in the official publications for the Township of Monroe (i.e.: South Jersey Times, Courier Post and The Sentinel of Gloucester County). A copy of that notice is posted on the bulletin board at the Municipal Complex and on the Monroe Township website.

Cncl. Pres., Gregory Wolfe stated, the Clerk has placed a sign-in sheet in the rear of the meeting room. If anyone would like to address Council, please sign-in and raise your hand and you will be asked to come forward to the microphone. Kindly state your name and address for the record.

B.) MATTERS FOR DISCUSSION

- Redevelopment Counsel Contract Resolution

Cncl. Falcone expressed her reasons for why Council should retain the current Redevelopment Counsel Contract with Matthew Lyons, Esq. She expressed her concerns with appointing Lou Cappelli, Esq. **Cncl. Pres. Wolfe** addressed Cncl. Falcone's concerns. **Cncl. Valcourt** asked why Council is only appointing the Redevelopment Counsel and not all of the Redevelopment professionals. **Business Administrator, Jill McCrea** explained, this was discussed last year and was clearly defined between Cncl. O'Reilly and Mayor DiLucia what appointments the Mayor is responsible for and what appointments Council is responsible for.

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B.) MATTERS FOR DISCUSSION (cont'd)

She noted, it depends on where the project is located as to whether the Planning Board Planner or the Zoning Board Planner handles the project. Ms. McCrea explained the reasons the Mayor would like to reappointment Matthew Lyons, Esq. as the Redevelopment Counsel, with the advice and consent of Council, noting specifically for continuity and to save the taxpayers money of not having to restart with new counsel. **Solicitor Trimble** explained this appointment is the Mayor's responsibility, with the advice and consent of Council. He noted, if no appointment is made, the town will move forward, as his office can perform this work. **Cncl. Falcone** made a motion to move this item forward as a Resolution for vote at this evening's Council Meeting. The motion was seconded by **Cncl. McKinney**. **Cncl. Pres. Wolfe** asked Municipal Clerk, Aileen Chiselko, to number the Resolution R:86-2022 and add it to the Resolutions listed on the Agenda for approval this evening.

Cncl. McKinney spoke regarding the Captains Contract, noting he was unfortunately absent at the last meeting and asked if the matter could be brought forward this evening for reconsideration. **Cncl. Pres. Wolfe** replied that it cannot be reconsidered, which he and **Solicitor Trimble** cited Robert's Rules of Orders in regards to reconsidering. **Mayor DiLucia** spoke in reference to the situation and explained why a motion was made to reconsider at the previous Council Meeting. A discussion between Mayor DiLucia and Cncl. Pres. Wolfe ensued. The Mayor stated, he is putting Cncl. Pres. Wolfe on notice and is asking that an investigation be conducted by an impartial body to investigate why Cncl. Pres. Wolfe interfered with the negotiations, what his involvement with the members were and if he was politically biased. **Solicitor Trimble** advised, to date, he has not seen any formal complaint or any written complaint to the governing body or to the Mayor concerning said discussion. The discussion continued between Mayor DiLucia and Cncl. Pres. Wolfe. **Cncl. Falcone** stated that never has an employee come to her or the rest of Council regarding their contract negotiations. **Cncl. O'Reilly** suggested that the Mayor and Council follow the Labor Attorney's position to investigate the situation. **Solicitor Trimble** advised, parliamentary procedures can be waived if Council decides to vote on the matter again. Cncl. Pres. Wolfe stated, Council may vote on the matter again when there is a material amendment.

C.) QUESTIONS REGARDING RESOLUTIONS SCHEDULED

Cncl. Pres. Wolfe spoke regarding Resolutions R:77-2022, R:78-2022 and R:79-2022 pertaining to the release of Performance Guarantees and acceptance of the Maintenance Guarantees for the Stirling Glen Development. He noted that there were some previous concerns with their retention basin, asked if these issues have been resolved and if these bonds were for the basin. He asked if it affects Council voting on these Resolutions this evening, if there are still basin issues. **Solicitor Trimble** explained that it is the recommendation of the engineer that is provided prior to the solicitor's review, which the engineer confirms compliance and recommends moving forward, so the question should be posed to the engineer. He clarified that the release of bonds is always prompted by an inspection by the engineers.

Falcone**, whose vote was “nay”, questioned voting on the meeting minutes if all of the minutes from January 24, 2022 are not included, as minutes of the Closed Executive Session of January 24, 2022 (Collective Bargaining) were removed for approval from the Agenda. **Solicitor Trimble** stated, he will research if minutes need to be presented as a whole

for approval or if they can be separated for approval. **Cncl. Cncl. Pres. Wolfe made a motion to approve Ordinance O:04-2022 for First Reading and Publication. The motion was seconded by **Cncl. Falcone** and unanimously approved by all members of Council in attendance.

I.) NEW BUSINESS

Cncl. Pres. Wolfe asked the Mayor for his intentions with regards to professional services, as the Township Engineer appointment did not have the consent of Council in 2021 and 2022; there was no appointment offered in 2021 and 2022 to address that Council would consent to a new engineer, as well as this year, the Solicitor's appointment did not have the consent of Council. **Cncl. Pres. Wolfe** expressed his concerns pertaining to the contract for 2021 that was entered into for the Township Engineer, without the consent of Council. **Mayor DiLucia** noted, he believes that the Township is entitled to carryover. **Cncl. Pres. Wolfe** requested that the CFO research if the Township has paid any of the increased fees, which are stated in the 2021 contract and if they have, those fees should be refunded back to the Township. **Mayor DiLucia** stated, if additional fees have been paid, he will ensure that the money is refunded. A discussion ensued between **Cncl. Pres. Wolfe** and **Mayor DiLucia**.

J.) UNFINISHED BUSINESS – None

K.) REPORTS AND OTHER MATTERS

Mayor DiLucia spoke regarding the contract negotiations that were done to help save the taxpayers money and the allegations for which the contract was voted against. He explained how the negotiations were performed legally and without intimidation. He expressed his concerns with the approval of any future contracts that he negotiates. **Mayor DiLucia** advised that the Township's Labor Attorney will now be involved with all contract negotiations to avoid any allegations in the future. He spoke in reference to the Redevelopment Attorney and how his work is being blocked. The Planner was also discussed and he noted in the case where there is a question about who should be the Planner or the Engineer, if one of them has started a job, he allows them to continue the job, so that the developers will not be delayed. He spoke in reference to the Master Plan, which he believes will exceed \$100,000.00 by the time it is completed, which is being completed by a Planner that he did not appoint, but he allowed him to keep the job, as it is prudent and saved the Township money. With regards to the Redevelopment Plan on Main Street, he allowed the Planner to keep and complete the job, because he had already charged the Township for half of the job. The Mayor believes it is apparent based on these examples, that he tries to ensure he deals with money as if it was his own and he will not pay twice, because he wants someone to receive the job. He noted that any mistakes that may be made are never deliberate, they are simply human mistakes. **Mayor DiLucia** stated, he is going to initiate an investigation over the allegations that have been made, noting he is concerned and if it is found that he has done something wrong, then he will stand for it.

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K.) REPORTS AND OTHER MATTERS (cont'd)

Solicitor Trimble reported on Route 322 and Fries Mill Road Project, noting that the Township has finally received a response from Chad Bruner, the Business Administrator of Gloucester County, in regards to the status. The status report stated that for the last twelve (12) years, Monroe Township has been incompetent and that is why the project, which is a County Road and a State Road, has not been completed. Solicitor Trimble stated, he is sifting through documentation from previous Administrations to determine the accuracy of the letter. He noted the allegations in the letter regarding what has occurred since 2019, are not true and he is gathering the evidence to provide to the County and ask that the County complete the project and stop playing games with Monroe Township.

Business Administrator, Ms. McCrea mentioned, after the Auditor was appointed for the year, she had called the managing partner and discussed pricing with him, as the pricing was significantly higher than the other proposals. The Auditor did work with her and she was able to lower the contract from \$90,000.00 to \$72,000.00.

Director of Community Affairs, Ms. Derieux stated, on March 17th, St. Patrick's Day, they will be hosting a free Senior Luncheon from 12:30pm to 2:00pm at the Pfeiffer Community Center. On March 18th at 6:30pm, there will be a Candy Bar Bingo for the Township residents; she asked that residents please call 856-728-9841 in advance for this event. On April 2nd from 10:00am to 1:00pm, there will be a Special Needs Family Fun Easter Egg Hunt and day for special needs families in the community. Ms. Derieux noted, Community Affairs is trying to host various events that will bring the community together.

Director of Parks & Recreation, Mr. Salvadori attended the OEM meeting on February 16th. On April 9th, the Parks and Recreation Commission will be hosting the annual Easter Egg Hunt at Owens Park beginning at 12:00pm, with a rain date of April 10th. The Easter Bunny will be in attendance with approximately 10,000 eggs.

Director of Public Safety, Mr. Kurz reported that the Mayor made some promotions within the Police Department: Captain Chris Tomasetto, Lieutenant Tom Bonsall, Sergeant Anthony Rivera along with four (4) new hires, two (2) of which are trained and two (2) will be attending the academy. Mr. Kurz commended the Police, Fire and EMS, who had a very busy weekend with numerous accidents and fires; all three entities did an excellent job.

Director of Public Works, Mr. Mercado reported, the Township will be receiving bids for the long-awaited dog park on March 2, 2022, noting he is looking forward to getting this project underway.

Police Chief Monahan thanked Mayor DiLucia for the recent promotions and for allowing the Police Department to hire new officers.

Cncl. Falcone attended the MMUA Reorganization Meeting on February 16th, where Anthony Neri was elected as Chairman and Robert Simone was elected as Vice-Chairman.

Cncl. McKinney spoke regarding the Historical Society, thanking Brandee Derieux for all of her help and hard work with the Black History Month activities. They will be hosting a Woman's History Month event on Saturday, March 26th at the Pfeiffer Community Center. Cncl. McKinney stated that the Environmental Protection Committee is looking for additional members and invited any interested individuals to complete a Citizen Leadership Form.

Cncl. O'Reilly addressed Cncl. Falcone and her statements made earlier in the meeting.

Cncl. Valcourt spoke in reference to a statement made by the Mayor, about every professional that he brings forward, Council turns down. Cncl. Valcourt stated, earlier this evening Council appointed the Redevelopment Counsel, which was provided by the Mayor. She stated that last year, the Redevelopment Committee made several recommendations that were not considered, noting she understands that it is the Mayor's legal right to choose who he sees fit; however, the Redevelopment Committee's recommendations were never considered. She urged the Mayor, that although he has the final say on appointments, that he listens to Council in earnest, even if he ultimately decides to make a different decision. Cncl. Valcourt reported, in

the beginning of February, the Redevelopment Committee and Administration met with two (2) redevelopment teams. The first redevelopment team is planning to build a warehouse space, to be located off of the Black Horse Pike and the second redevelopment team is planning to build a self-storage facility, to be located in the Cross-Keys Redevelopment Area. Cncl. Valcourt reported, the Economic Development Committee has their Reorganization Meeting scheduled for March 1st at 7:00pm. Cncl. Valcourt asked if anyone has anything that they would like to see on the next Ordinance Committee Meeting Agenda, to please feel free to reach out to her.

Cncl. Vice-Pres. Fox thanked Cncl. Valcourt, the Chair of the Redevelopment Committee. She noted, the Redevelopment Committee, which consists of herself, Cncl. Valcourt and Cncl. McKinney, have met with a few developers that they are very proud and excited to move forward with. Cncl. Vice-Pres. Fox congratulated the Police Officers who were recently promoted and hired.

Cncl. Pres. Wolfe attended the Parks and Recreation meeting on February 9th, where the Committee planned the annual Easter Egg Hunt to be held on April 9th at 12:00pm, with a rain date of April 10th at 12:00pm and located at Owens Memorial Park. He noted, the Committee is working diligently on the event, as it will be the first egg hunt in a couple of years due to the pandemic. The Committee is also working on bringing back the Musical Festival, which is scheduled to be held on June 4th with a rain date of June 5th. Cncl. Pres. Wolfe addressed some of the comments made by the Mayor earlier this evening, referencing Robert's Rules of Order and the Faulkner Act, expressing his concerns with said comments.

L.) GENERAL PUBLIC DISCUSSION

Cncl. Vice-Pres. Fox made a motion to open the General Public Discussion. The motion was seconded by **Cncl. Valcourt** and unanimously approved by all members of Council in attendance.

Joseph Sheridan, 244 Virginia Place, addressed Council to express his concerns with the Mobile Home Site Fee Ordinance, which was created in 1976 and amended in 2009. **Cncl. Pres. Wolfe** recommended that this matter be brought to the Ordinance Committee Meeting, which is scheduled for March 2nd, as a Matter of Discussion and invited Mr. Sheridan to attend.

Lindsey Belcher, 2820 Sunset Avenue, addressed Council regarding the poor road conditions in Victory Lakes and asked if there is a plan to have the roads repaved in the future. **Director of Public Works, Nicholas Mercado** advised, currently there is work being done by the gas company, noting the Township has an agreement with the gas company that whatever they disturb, they are to restore. He explained, several of the roads are on the current Road Program, which is set to commence in March and stated that he will evaluate the rest of the roads, once the work is completed by the gas company. **Cncl. Pres. Wolfe** spoke regarding the roads in Carriage Glen, asking Mr. Mercado the status of the paving, to which Mr. Mercado explained the status and the process. A discussion ensued with Solicitor Trimble, Mr. Mercado, Cncl. Pres. Wolfe and Cncl. O'Reilly regarding the roads and the responsibility of the developers.

Marlene McMahon, 173 Palomino Place, asked Solicitor Trimble if Council Members can be recalled, to which **Solicitor Trimble** advised there is a State statute allowing a recall election. Ms. McMahon expressed her concerns with taxes and comments made at the last few Council Meetings. Ms. McMahon addressed Cncl. Valcourt regarding her campaign speech and her thoughts on how Cncl. Valcourt voted regarding the Police Contract. **Cncl. Valcourt** addressed Ms. McMahon's comments. Ms. McMahon addressed Cncl. Fox and how she has voted, specifically regarding the Police Contract. **Cncl. Fox** addressed Ms. McMahon's comments. **Cncl. Pres. Wolfe** addressed Ms. McMahon's concerns. **Mayor DiLucia** spoke regarding the Police Contract, the Municipal Budget and the Crossing Guards Contract. A discussion ensued between Cncl. Pres. Wolfe and Mayor DiLucia.

Sherrie Kennedy, Bryn Mawr Drive, addressed Council to express her concerns relating to the Crossing Guards and the over payment that they have received.

Fernando Powers, 717 Meade Court, addressed Council regarding the Police Contract, asking if the retired Police Officer is going to lose his health benefits if the Contract is not approved. **Cncl. Pres. Wolfe** advised, the Officer is retiring in April 2022 and will retire under the contract that is in place when he retires. **Mayor DiLucia** spoke regarding the Police Contract and the negotiations that took place.
